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## Minister's Column

It has been a stressful time in our state and in our local community lately, what with the unemployment and fore-closure rates and the other negative effects of the economy. Even if those things are not affecting you directly, you may realize that you're experiencing greater stress. Religious communities are not immune to this either. For example, in the time after September 11th, 2001, even though some religious communities saw increased attendance, some also saw increased stress manifest through church conflict. It's easy for our personal worries and financial worries about our church, as well, to come out through an increase in negative energy in our personal lives and even in our spiritual lives. We start looking for the cause of the problem, and focusing all our energy on the unhealthy parts of ourselves or our community, rather than focusing on the positive, even if things are actually overwhelmingly positive.

If you find yourself more stressed in these times or any others, here are some things you can do, some from a religious perspective:

- If you have a spiritual practice, engage in it more regularly, or for longer periods. Meditation, prayer, focused breathing—all of these can be relaxing and help the stress ease from your body and mind. Singing and chanting are uplifting spiritual practices that can help with stress, as well. Whatever your practice, from journaling to jogging, now is not the time to sacrifice it, but to really engage it.
- 2. If you don't have a spiritual practice, this is an excellent time to try out a new one, or to try multiple ones. You could make a practice of trying a new type of spiritual practice on a regular basis. Some things, like yoga or tai chi may require signing up for a whole class to really do right, but you can find simple steps on the internet for basic body movements and try a physical spiritual practice of a similar sort—or make up your own!
- 3. Try exercise—and in a relaxing, spiritual way. Now that the weather is getting warmer, take a walk, run, or hike in a natural setting.
- 4. Acknowledge the negative, but don't dwell on it. Rather, focus on the positive. One way I do this is when someone tells me about something negative someone else has done, I try to put myself in that later person's shoes. What made him or her act that way? What stresses might he or she be experiencing in her or his life?

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- 5. Avoid the news for a few days. The overwhelming negative nature of the news can increase our stress levels by making us focus on these things, even when they have little relevance to our lives and we can do nothing about them. Simply cutting out listening/ reading/watching it for a few days can bring life back into perspective again. Instead, bring a positive influence into your life in its stead for a few days. Instead of reading the paper over your breakfast cereal, read poetry. Instead of listening to NPR in the car, listen to music. I'm not advocating complete ignorance of what's going on forever, but a few days respite will help decrease stress.
- 6. Laugh and smile—even if you don't mean it. Try it right now as you're reading this column. Set your timer or clock and take a laugh break every so often.
- 7. Spend time with an animal. Petting a cat or dog for a period, walking the dog, throwing a ball with one, can all help us lower our stress level.
- 8. Lastly, Make an appointment with your minister, your therapist or counselor, or even your massage therapist! With paid professionals, you may think this is a time you should be more frugal, but this may be just the time you need it most. (And a visit with your minister is always free!)

The Reverend Cindy has given the Sabbatical Committee a Handbook on Sabbatical Leaves. It is helping to familiarize us with the concept of ministerial sabbaticals. The committee is working with Cindy to begin planning for her sabbatical in 2010. The handbook says, "Ministerial sabbaticals were not an invention of the current generation, but until [thirty-five] years ago they were granted only by large congregations . . . UU ministers and congregations have been pioneers in developing a rationale for sabbaticals, and in establishing standards and structures for them. Several other faith-groups have encouraged and provided funds for relatively brief study leaves for their ministers, but UUs have been among the first to develop and promote the sabbatical as a valid and valuable practice for ministers and the congregations they serve." Lord, Save Us from Your Followers!
On Good Friday, April 10th, Pathway
Community Church, Rivertree Community
Church, and Parents, Friends and Family of
Lesbians And Gays (PFLAG) of Jackson will cohost a public screening of the documentary
film, Lord, Save Us From Your Followers. The
movie will be shown at the Michigan Theatre,
124 N. Mechanic St., at 7:00 pm. Admission is
free. An open-forum panel discussion will take
place immediately following. UUCEL Minister
Cynthia Landrum will be participating in the
panel.

"Our goal is to help people engage with one another in respectful dialogue across cultural divisions," says senior pastor of Pathway Community Church, Scott Hardaway. "Too much of the discourse that takes place in the public square is divisive, insulting, and makes us feel that we can't have a relationship with one another."

That same sentiment was behind the creation of this movie. Fed up with the strident language that has come to represent the Christian faith, writer/director Dan Merchant set out to discover why the Gospel of Love is dividing America. A thought-provoking, often amusing documentary that uses expert interviews, man on-the-street encounters, animation and "I've never seen that before" stunts, Lord, Save Us From Your Followers brings everyone into the conversation that this country is aching to have.

With exclusive interviews with comedian/ Senatorial candidate Al Franken, former senator and religious right ally Rick Santorum, noted liberal evangelical Tony Campolo, conservative radio host Michael Reagan and racial reconciliation activist Dr. John Perkins as well as film clips of Bono, Pastor Rick Warren (*The Purpose Driven Life*), and evangelists James Dobson, Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson, the film leaves no stone unturned in presenting an engaging, unpredictable and challenging look at the conflict over religion in America.
