### Minister's Column

Dear UUCEL Members & Friends,

We're in the middle of our pledge drive as I write this, and still will be as you read this, and what has been occurring to me, and to others in our church leadership, is that our increased need to focus on fundraising has driven the limited energy of our church's volunteers, while other areas, like spiritual growth and social justice, have had less involvement. To that end, we're certainly hoping we can raise more of our money this year in direct pledging and have less need for fundraising. However, we are also starting dialogues with other churches in our area about working together in new ways. First Congregational in Jackson, in particular, has been reaching out to us, and our board has voted to start a committee with them of people interested in building collaboration between our two churches, particularly in religious education, where we have some strengths to lend them, and in social justice, where we have many common goals. Jackie Johnson will be the board liaison to this effort. Another collaboration in the works comes from the Michigan UU Social Justice Network which has been working with Jim and Donna Benedict at St John's UCC Church to create a special Healthcare forum in Jackson, probably in May. Since it's a joint UU/UCC effort, they're asking us to come on board as co-sponsors and to help publicize the event. This is something our board may address in April, and something we might ask First Congregational to join us in. If you're interested in being part of either of these efforts, let me know. These dialogues with our local UCC congregations comes at a timely moment. UCC churches share a historical bond with us, as the Unitarians broke off from the Congregationalists (or we might say the two each broke from the other), and our UUA president sat down for a dialogue with the UCC president just this past February. The UU World wrote about this dialogue and our common ground with the UCC saying, "The two associations often overlap in their social justice work, advocating for similar causes, such as marriage equality, and signing on to the same public statements. Last week, for example, both the UUA and the UCC came out in support of the Jan. 20 announcement by the United States Department of Health and Human Services that contraceptive services must be covered by most insurance policies without deductibles or co-pays, and that only purely sectarian organizations should be exempt." Our UUCEL board spent a good deal of time at our last board meeting particularly discussing the sexuality religious

# Religious Education

### Report

Spring brings with it a time of change and renewal. It feels like the "Church Buddies" breakfast and RE Sunday became a turning point within which change is constant, like a turning wheel. My miniature daffodils and forsythia have bloomed, and my other spring flowers are budding, bringing the hope of lovely outdoor times ahead.

We got good feedback from the RE Sunday service. The K-6 class is learning about New Testament stories for the rest of the school year. The youth will be visiting St. Rita's Church on April 1, and debriefing in the weeks after that. Then we'll decide what other churches should be visited.

Spring brought a tornado to Dexter, and I was at my other job within a mile or so of "ground zero" when it struck. We hunkered down in windowless rooms and were lucky to have no damage at The Cedars other than a few wood chips out of place from the heavy rain and hail. United Methodist Retirement Communities (which is separate from the United Methodist Church, by the way, and nondenominational regarding staff and residents) is housing at least seven families who were rendered homeless by tornado damage—most who are families with children in Dexter schools. You can see how my Presbyterian upbringing comes into play for me when I remembered the Bible verse, "When God's children are in need, you be the one to help them out." Of course, I think "God's children" means all children, regardless of creed. I guess it's also like Gandhi's saying, "You must be the change you wish to see in the world." This is the kind of lesson that we can teach our UU children, too—that when there is a need, or a person suffering, we should ask ourselves, "what can I do to help?"

The experience of helping to get procedures in place for housing these families, and helping to get their temporary homes equipped fast with furniture, appliances and household items, has been immensely rewarding as well as emotionally draining; I assume this is especially true for our organization's CEO, who survived Hurricane Katrina in Gulfport, Mississippi but lost his home and his livelihood there in the process. I guess this contributed to my getting emotional while I read Beatrice's Goat, about Heifer International's help for a Ugandan village.

Thank you to those who are helping with nursery/K-6 (combined) coverage for April 1, including Martha Koopman, and to Lynn Hightower and Gordon Bernstein, who are taking the youth to St. Rita's that day.

We are putting together a plan for offering "Peace Camp" in August, and will be recruiting teachers both for that effort, and for Fall. I would appreciate your asking yourself, "what can I do to help?" Thanks as always for your support.
