Minister's Column

"Love is the water that wears down the rock." These are words from a Brother Sun song. Brother Sun is a musical trio I heard perform at SUUSI, the Southeast UU Summer Institute. As we begin our church year with our water communion, these words bring new meaning to the water ceremony for me.

"Love is the water that wears down the rock." Our loving community is the living water – so what is the rock? The rock can be hearts hardened against other people. The Unitarian Universalist Association's "Standing on the Side of Love" campaign uses love to combat identity-based oppression against people. The rock can also be struggles within our own community, and the song lyrics can remind us to treat each other in loving ways, to follow the Golden Rule.

The other aspect of "Love is the water that wears down the rock," is to be mindful that it's not a sledge hammer that wears down the rock—it's water. It's a process that happens slowly, imperceptibly, and takes a great deal of time—but it does happen. Too often we expect immediate results, and when we don't get them, we give up. The song lyrics remind us that true change takes time. This is definitely true in social action—the early suffragist and abolitionists didn't see the changes they sought in their lifetimes. But it is also true in interpersonal relations. It may not take the decades that social action can sometimes take, but opening a heart that's been hardened from pain and neglect can be a slow and difficult process.

Love is not a magic cure—it's not something where you can add one dose of it and all ills are gone. But it is the water that wears down the rock. Give it enough time, and it will prevail.



Summer Staffing

Those who have been following church events for the last few months will recall that our board proposed a budget this year that cut all of our staff members from the budget. Following that announcement, an anonymous donor gave a \$5000 matching donation. The congregation passed the budget with the assumption that the money that was already coming in for the matching grant, along with any additional money raised, would go to balancing our budget, with a priority for restoring staff positions. At the June board meeting, money was still coming in to match the \$5000, and the board voted to restore our staff as of September 1st, thanks to the incredible generosity that had already been shown by our members as of that meeting date. This has meant, however, that we have had no staff members in July, which resulted in our having our shortened "This I Believe" series in lieu of full worship services. In August we go back to full worship services, but with guest musicians and no childcare and religious education coordinator. As a result, we'll be needing double the number of volunteers for the nursery in July, or we may have no nursery care provided in July as an alternative. What is still possible, however, is that the board may, at the August 1st board meeting, either restore staffing for August, or slide our ten months of staff forward into August so that our religious education program is better able to get under way. We realize this ambiguity makes it difficult for our staff members, minister, and volunteers, but we're also pleased that our congregation worked so hard to restore our staff to the levels that we have. Lastly, it may be possible that we will finish the year with a surplus. Should that happen, this may help us to bridge the gap into the next year, where our matching grant will no longer be a part of our budget. Submitted by: Rev. Cindy
