Minister's Column

I've just returned from Louisville, Kentucky, where our nember Lynn Hightower and I spent several days at the Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly (GA). I also attended the UU Minister's Association's Ministry Days preceding the GA. There were several things of interest that happened at GA that I'd like to tell you about.

First, this year we elected a new moderator after ten years with Gini Coulter as our moderator. Moderators usually can only be elected twice for two four-year terms, but Gini Coulter had finished out the previous moderator's term, which is how she got to be in the role for ten years. Our new moderator is Jim Key. Jim Key won a narrow victory (945 to 905) against Tamara Payne-Alex. Everything I heard at GA suggested that this was a very tight race because they were both well-qualified candidates. The moderator chairs the UUA board of trustees, is our highest elected position after president, and is usually a lay person. Interestingly, this is the first time we've had a man in the role since Sandra Caron took over from Joseph Fisher in 1977.

One vote that was really important to us this year at General Assembly was the vote to include the concept of a "region" alongside "district" in the UUA bylaws. As you may recall, our district, Heartland District, along with the Central Midwest District and Prairie Star District, voted to disband the districts and unite together in one region. The biggest question in the discussion of the bylaws was why we couldn't just be one big district instead of having to add regions to the bylaws. Indeed, since the change is a two-year vote, we will be considered a district for one year until next year's GA. Ultimately, however, the General Assembly did pass the vote to include regions.

An exciting part of the plenary sessions, to me, is our voting on Actions of Immediate Witness, or AIWs. From the list of AIWs which get enough signatures, the General Assembly delegates choose three to admit to the agenda. All three AIWs were then passed by the General Assembly delegates. The first one was a statement about corporations not being people and money not being speech, asking us to work for a constitutional amendment to that effect. The third one asks all our congregations to consider divesting from fossil fuels. But the second one was the one that was most exciting to me, since it followed up on our work on *The New Jim Crow*. It was a

statement against "stop and frisk" policies and against mass incarceration of people of color. In an amazing show of support for this AIW, there were no delegates who spoke from the con microphone against the AIW, and the vote was overwhelmingly passed. I saw literally only a handful of votes against the AIW, and a hall full of support for this issue. I think the combination of having Michelle Alexander speak on this at last year's GA and so many churches reading The New Jim Crow made us educated on the issue and unified in our response.

There's much more I could tell you, such as about the Welcoming Congregation renewal process that Lynn and I learned about, the amazing worship services, and changes to the minister's code of ethics (to make it stricter on sexual ethics, which is a change I'm glad to see). Most of all, however, I want to tell you that General Assembly is a wonderful experience—it can showcase the best of preaching and music in our movement, detail the cutting edge of information on congregational growth and management, and spur us to social action individually, in our congregations, and as a GA. This year's public witness event was the largest ever in Kentucky on energy issues! And there's increasingly good programming for children there, with a "Covenant Camp" that started with fifth graders through junior high this year. I'll be going to GA next year in Providence, and would love to have you come with me!
