Minister's Column

Greetings UUCEL Members and Friends!

Women's History Month, St. Patrick's Day, Lent, Purim, and the First Day of Spring. I'm wearing green and a Susan B. Anthony necklace to get myself in the mood as I write this on "Fat Tuesday." St. Patrick's Day and Women's History Month are the only two of these I usually personally celebrate, and St. Patrick's Day is only a recent addition for me since I married into an Irish Catholic family. Growing up, my family's only St. Patrick's Day tradition was green bagels, believe it or not.

But in recent years, I've found more and more Unitarian Universalists who observe Lent in different ways. Lent is the Christian season leading up to Easter, and in many Christian branches it's a time to reflect, pray, and to give up something through fasting, almsgiving, or denying oneself something. Most often we hear about people observing Lent through denying a pleasure to themselves that they think of as "sinful" or bad — rich foods, smoking, drinking. The Jewish holy day of Purim is also sometimes marked by almsgiving.

March is also the time during which we will get our annual pledge drive underway. And the church needs your increased support. Our pledging is low, and our ability to cover the gap between what we need and what we get in pledges through additional fundraisers is stretched to its limit. This year the fundraisers in our budget have not been happening, as more and more groups that previously have held fundraisers have reached burn-out. Our situation is as difficult as it has ever been.

So this March, as you are greeted by a canvasser, I ask you to really think about your giving as a religious act that you are making. It is an act of living your religion, of committing yourself on a deep and personal level to the mission of Unitarian Universalism. In giving to the church, you are participating in our faith on as deep and sacred a level as a Christian sacrificing for Lent. Is there something that you can give up this year or this season to be able to give more to the church? It's a hard thing to ask, but our church is reaching a turning-point, I think, where we can either give more to our mission and vision and really make some changes and grow in spirit and outreach, or we can continue to make cuts deeper and deeper, diminishing our ability to do much beyond hold a Sunday worship service and keep our building running, and making doing even that increasingly difficult.

There's an ancient story of Nasruddin, a mystical trickster figure in the Sufi religion, in which Nasruddin greets two beggars. One is having a hard time living in poverty—he craves rich foods, fine fabrics. The other is content with simple means and simple food. Who does Nasruddin give more alms to? Surprisingly, he gives more to the first man, saying that his needs are greater. There are a wealth of messages here, but one is that Nasruddin is not putting a value on simplicity and severeness, rewarding the austere man, but rather, giving each man what he needs to be more content. We often put value judgements on money, treating money as bad, dirty, and shameful. It's hard for churches to ask for money in this society, because by asking for it we automatically are seen as less worthy of receiving it. Churches are supposed to have a Zen-like or Quaker-like simplicity, or a Catholic priest-like vow of poverty. Anything more is seen as greedy. But we need money to live our mission, beyond just putting heat in our sanctuary. And we deserve a religious home that can fill those spiritual needs not only for fine music and art, but for living out our social mission, and educating our children and broadcasting our message beyond our four walls.

Thank you for taking this message into your heart and deeply considering it. Our community is graced by the presence and gifts of each person who joins us in our faith journey. You make up this beloved community, and you are the church. Your gifts to us are gifts to yourself, and you deserve it.
