Minister's Column

When I interviewed with the search committee before coming to UUCEL, a member of the search committee asked me if I thought I would preach less often from a manuscript as I gained experience. "No," I responded, "I just hope that my texts will get even better." True to my word, I've been a manuscript preacher this whole time. There are a lot of reasons why I like preaching from a manuscript. It allows me to share my words with people again later (and our recording equipment is currently not working). It allows me to carefully craft some of my sentences. I can quote things more easily and more often. And I don't forget my points or where I am. Mostly, it has to do with my love of the written word. I enjoy the process of writing, even when it's laborious, and I like the result of a written manuscript. I think I'm more eloquent and more precise in written form.

This past month, however, I attended a workshop by Rev. Stephen Shick and Rev. Dr. M'ellen Kennedy, called "Preaching By Heart: the art of preaching without a manuscript—in the Universalist style" (www.preachingbyheart.org). Shick and Kennedy made a powerful argument that extemporaneous preaching, preaching from the heart, is what's called for in our current era in Unitarian Universalism where people are hungering for authenticity in an increasingly fake (think: plastic) world.

It's very rare these days that I take a ministry workshop that radically changes how I do things. But this workshop was a really wonderful experience. We preached to each other in small covenant groups, doing short five-minute sermons. These group times were interspersed with worship and lectures. The whole conference had to be cut short because of an approaching snowstorm, but it was still very meaningful.

As a result of this workshop, I've made a commitment to myself to do more of my preaching extemporaneously. It seems only fitting, since I'm requiring my communications students to do extemporaneous speeches, as well! Hopefully, my preaching and my teaching will both strengthen each other.

I hope you will enjoy this new turn in my preaching. It's likely to be less academic and more "by heart."

If this works out well there will be opportunities to continue this group, or start one again in the Fall.

As Robert Hill says, "Covenant groups are a transformational practice through which we, with others, can discover our own underlying assumptions about reality and examine our ways of being, some of which have become so habitual that they seem to us just 'the way things are.' The practice of Small Group Ministry asks us to suspend judgment long

enough to hear respectfully the understandings of others, even those vastly different from our own."

I'm looking forward to the coming of Spring!
