March is...

Women's History Month – so to kick off the month I'm finishing out the series on transcendentalists that I began with Thoreau and Emerson last month. I'll be preaching on Margaret Fuller, not only a Unitarian and transcendentalist, but also a famous writer, speaker, and advocate for women's equality. Sharon Pedersen will round out the month by preaching on a famous Universalist woman minister and also a suffragist: Olympia Brown. She's a personal hero of both Sharon and mine.

The Big Read Month – The Jackson community is encouraged to read our "Big Read" book every March for the last few years, and this year is *The Grapes of Wrath*. I'm still finishing it. We Welcome Your Membership Not a member? We'd love to have you join our spiritual community. New members signify their commitment by signing the Membership Book during a scheduled church service. It is understood that members actively support their congregation through attendance, service and financial commitment. To start your process of becoming an official member of our lively, compassionate and challenging congregation, speak with Rev. Cindy Landrum, (517) 529-4221, or a member of the membership committee, including Kathy Haynes, Joan Bernstein Jann Krupa and Carole Hartsuff.

During my tenure on the Board, I've seen several wonderful proposals for the use of our building and grounds. Groups and individuals have spent many hours planning the Memorial Garden's design and guidelines for use. The congregation completed a survey regarding window replacements, and Steve Beison researched the various options and prices. In the meantime, there's been an ongoing discussion about the Capital Campaign funds and the importance of using them as they were intended (creating a larger sanctuary).

Each time the board has considered one of these plans, however, we have found it may be in direct competition with building a new space. We have had concerns that the Memorial Garden will restrict our options for adding space to the existing structure. We also have apprehension about replacing windows and possibly using Capital Campaign funds if we intend to use the space less frequently. Lastly, we struggle with the fact that our church has not yet identified a reasonable plan for building a larger sanctuary. As a congregation, we put a lot of effort into planning for a very large addition and canvassing our members for sizeable donations. Since that plan was determined to be beyond our reach, our membership has evolved yet our planning has remained stagnant.

If any of my statements make you angry, hopeful, excited, annoyed, or resentful, then you need to stay after church on Sunday, March 1st. The Board will respectfully solicit the ideas and opinions of our members and friends, and invite you to participate in a discussion about the long-term use and planning of our building and grounds. No votes will be taken that day but we may begin to form a committee for the purpose of long-range planning. Please consider if you'd be interested in making any time commitment to this planning process. Our ancestors in faith made many sacrifices

to build us a glorious space for worship. We need a variety of ideas and expertise to develop a well-rounded, well-considered plan that will fulfill the dreams of our future generations.



Ministerial Sabbatical

Sabbaticals have been standard practice in the UU ministry among ministers serving churches full time. A sabbatical is a very old concept that relates to a period of rest or change. Its root is in the word *Sabbath*, the biblical term referring to the day of rest after six days of work. The Rev. Cindy's Letter of Agreement with the UUCEL states that she will have a sabbatical after five but before eight years of service. Her tentative plan is to take a sabbatical for six months after her sixth year. That would be the 2009-2010 church year. She would use this time for study, education, writing, meditation, and other forms of professional and religious growth. To that end the Board of Trustees has begun to sequester funds to cover costs for the sabbatical, and Cindy, with the permission of the Board, has created a Sabbatical Committee. Members are Steve Beison, Ann Green, Carole Hartsuff, and Victor Marshall.

This committee explains the sabbatical concept to the congregation; arranges coverage during the sabbatical time; keeps the profile of the sabbatical in the forefront of the congregation, and eases Cindy's transition back into the congregation. The committee will keep the congregation informed in a variety of ways every month this year. Questions you may have should be directed to committee members. Help us think about how to make this a fruitful experience for both the Rev. Cindy and the congregation.

Katrina Relief Service Trip To New Orleans

Saturday July 11-Sunday July 19 Heartland Congregations! Come join a work project in New Orleans this summer. We can make a difference! Our plan is to leave on Saturday, spend the night in Tuscaloosa, visit their service in the morning and continue on to First Church in New Orleans. Once in New Orleans we will sleep on cots in gender separated dorm rooms and share cooking and clean up responsibilities. Work days will be Monday through Friday with plenty of time to view the city and opportunities to explore New Orleans culture, perhaps, at a minimum, a stroll through the French Quarter.

Cost of the trip for UUs is \$20.00 per night per person in New Orleans plus food, travel expenses and discretionary monies. Older youth (15 +) are invited, but small children are not well accommodated. One group is leaving from Evansville. Others may join us there or en route.
