It's just an auction where we sell thing to raise money for the church, right? Well, yes, but that's not what makes it so great. It's really about having a fun evening being social with the wonderful people you know or are getting to know at our church. We have a large crowd come, have dinner together, have programming for the children, and then we have the auction. And during the auction people are talking and enjoying and, yes, bidding on some really neat things and fabulous deals.

The auction, like so much of what we do, is hard to explain the appeal of when you haven't experienced it. If you haven't experienced Unitarian Universalism, for example, what we do sounds like any other church—worship services, potlucks, religious education. What's so special about that? Religious Education Report

Happy Spring!

This is always an energizing time of year for me, between the better weather and the "busybusy-busy" of planning for summer and fall programs. I also got to attend the District Annual Meeting in Ann Arbor in April, and brought home lots of fresh ideas about multigenerational programs and such. It was great to reconnect with and hear from other religious educators, and people from both large and small congregations!

I will be working out details with the Worship Committee on what (if any) summer programs we'll be providing for kids, and those will be announced in the June newsletter, if not before. One concept I believe we will "run with" is to start the Religious Education school year up earlier, to give August "church shoppers" an idea of what our programs are like. I am proud to announce that all the classes next year will have curricula focused on social action. We will start lessons in the second week of August (after the annual church picnic), which means much of our planning needs to take place before mid-June.

Volunteer recruitment is much on the RE Committee members' minds. Since we will have enough kids for a preschool class again this year, we will need all the volunteers we can get!

Here are the numbers of dedicated teachers we need to recruit: ~ Preschool: at least 4 for to teach once per month (two lessons per month) ~ K-5: at least 8 to teach once per month (3-4 lessons per month) ~ Youth: at least 8 (same as K-5 schedule) ~ Subs and Craft Day volunteers: at least 12 (avg. of one "Craft Day" per month, at least two teachers, teaching twice a year) ~ Summer: to be determined ~ Nursery volunteers: 54 slots (once a week plus 2 for Christmas eve)

Plus, we can always use volunteers for Community Forum nights and other special occasions!

So, this adds up to a volunteer "corps" of about 18 teachers to teach about once a month, and, 12 volunteers filling in as substitutes or craft day teachers, and, if the nursery volunteers were willing to teach once per quarter, that would be about 14 volunteers, too. If you get a call about regular or occasional RE volunteering, I hope you will "heed the call"! Especially if it's been some time since you have taught previously.

At the RE Committee meeting in April, we went through the whole church contact list & brainstormed potential regular and substitute/ craft day teachers for the Fall. Along with 13 current teachers who will be asked it they will "re-up" their "contracts" to teach again next year, we came up with a list of nine additional potential teachers and 14 potential "subs"/ occasional teachers. So if most of you say "yes," we'll be all set!

I want to help our volunteers avoid burnout, because if they're not enjoying teaching it won't be productive for the kids, either. That's why it's important for them to say "no" if they've been teaching and need a break. All the more reason we need new volunteers!

Speaking of volunteers needed, we need a nursery helper for this May 9.

Just so you know, I sign myself up for a fair amount of teaching slots, also, when two volunteers are not available; but the more I don't "have" to teach, the more I can help in a supervisory way, to have supplies and volunteers available. Today at church (April 18) was a perfect example: I was filling in for K-5 because the assigned teacher did not feel up to the task; a nursery volunteer asked to be relieved so she could get some cookies for social hour, and because Rev. Cindy was sitting in on the K-5 class, I could ask her to take my place so I could slide into the nursery. So then a social hour without an assigned volunteer could have cookies (thanks, Nancy Smith!). Sometimes it feels like a little "flying by the seat-of-our-pants," but just as in parenting, one needs some flexibility, and it all turned out fine. The k-5 kids loved making their own chalices out of flowerpots!
