## Minister's Column

I've been writing a lot about the boundaries of what we talk about and do not talk about in our churches, such as partisan politics. But it's important to remember that in November we also talk about ballot issues, and that we as a church can take stands on ballot issues, and have in the past. We have not voted on any of the current ballot issues as a church, but there are many things we can say about the stands that Unitarian Universalism, as a whole, has taken.

Here's what we have said as part of our larger association on one of the issues that's before us: stem cell research. In 2006 the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association passed an "Action of Immediate Witness" titled, "Pass the Stem Cell Research Enhancement Act," in which we called on members and congregations to "Oppose restrictions to the advancement of stem cell science, as long as the rights of women donating eggs and couples donating embryos are appropriately protected and there is no intention of human reproductive cloning." Now, the Michigan ballot initiative is not about restrictions, it's about permissions, but if you're interested in some of the argument that this Action of Immediate Witness built its resolution on, in order to inform your vote, it can be viewed at <http://www.uua.org/socialjustice/socialjustice/statements/8064.shtml>

Another issue on our Michigan ballot is the legalization of medical marijuana. The General Assembly did pass a general resolution titled "Legalization of Marijuana" in 1970, and in a 2002 "Statement of Conscience" passed by the General Assembly titled "Alternatives to the 'War on Drugs,'" we said, "Make all drugs legally available with a prescription by a licensed physician, subject to professional oversight. End the practice of punishing an individual for obtaining, possessing, or using an otherwise illegal substance to treat a medical condition. End the threat to impose sanctions on physicians who treat patients with opiates for alleviation of pain."

However you vote on the ballot issues this November, however, the most important thing is voting at all. One of our UU principles is "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large." It's time to get out there and live our religion!

# Notes from the Board

## My Thanks for Liberal Religious Education

We're fast approaching the holiday season, sure to be full of anxiety over truly unimportant details. Since becoming a parent, I've discovered even more causes for holiday anxiety. For example, Jon and I were concerned about Aubrey's first Christmas Party in Kindergarten last year. We worried what religious content would find its way into the classroom. We worried on behalf of other non-Christian families. I also worried what people would think of us for making any sort of noise about this issue (I'm sure you know that Jon didn't share that particular concern). Ultimately, we decided it would be more harmful for Aubrey if we excluded her from the holiday events on the basis of mere principle.

Aubrey's Christmas party went just swell and did not include any attempts to save her soul. A more rational fear should have been over her grandparents' attempts to educate Aubrey about the little baby Jesus, about which she had little biblical context. Her grandparents had had a few religious conversations with her that later lead to confused questions for us. Our belabored attempts at thoughtful answers generally lost her interest, making us wonder if she'd benefited from either of the conversations.

Later that holiday season, she and I were at a party with my coworkers, during which Aubrey entertained a couple by reviewing the characters in a small nativity crèche. These Christian friends were so impressed with my 5-year-old's knowledge and recitation that even I had to ask her where she had learned all this information. "In the play," she responded, "at church". Well, of course. At our church, where we can revere the story of the baby Jesus and other religious stories that teach us about miraculous goodness. At that moment, she had no questions about the story she'd learned at church. She had learned and created meaning about the story, yet she did not suddenly believe that the Son of God had been born of the Virgin Mary.

So during this holiday season, I'll give thanks for my church and its religious education programming. Like virtually all parents, I don't always have the right answer. In this church, I know Aubrey will hear questions and answers that will fill in my gaps. I know other loving adults will help teach her values we all share. Some of those adults will share religious stories they believe, and Aubrey will decide which stories have meaning. In the meantime, she'll still participate in all kinds of Christmas events, because she likes the story of baby Jesus and she still believes in Santa.
