Minister's Column

The Unitarian transcendentalist and abolitionist minister Theodore Parker once said, "I do not pretend to understand the moral universe; the arc is a long one, my eye reaches but little ways; I cannot calculate the curve and complete the figure by the experience of sight; I can divine it by conscience. And from what I see I am sure it bends towards justice." His words were taken and adapted by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and many others since.

These are words that keep coming to me this week, as we marked yet another delay on the road to marriage equality in Michigan. It feels like we keep getting our hopes up in this state, only to encounter another road block. Yet I know that the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice. This week we saw New Jersey become the fourteenth state to have marriage equality. The map of the Eastern United States is starting to look like two brackets with Michigan in the middle, along with a couple of other states, bracketed by Minnesota and lowa on the West and all of New England, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware on the Eastern side. I know that before long this space in the middle we hold will bend toward justice. I have faith that I will see it, and the rest of the country as well, as the U.S. becomes a land with marriage equality.

This month we have a special guest program with the Know Us Project (see page 7). Wherever you are on the spectrum of support for marriage equality and adoption, and the other issues the LGBT community faces discrimination in, I hope you will join us for this informative and educational program. It's an opportunity for our community to refresh ourselves on some facts, and rededicate our-selves to being the welcoming community that we are.

At the recent anniversary celebration of the Civil Rights march on Washington, President Obama said, "The arc of the moral universe may bend toward justice, but it doesn't bend on its own." I think he had it exactly right, and Theodore Parker would agree. Join with me this month in bending the arc.
