Meanwhile, let's have a lot of fun together this September as we engage in the work of faith, justice, and community!

Do we have a voice about how children and adults are treated locally? Do we practice the First Principle in the area? How do we show we care about the community and the world? The RE Committee members will be calling the agencies we support to find out about volunteer opportunities, and we will be asking the congregation for input as to what types of social action projects you might like to be involved with, through clipboard signups and a suggestion list to be posted later in September. I think getting together even in small groups to do social action projects will be a lot of fun; I have fond memories of our recycling together, for instance.

Jesus Seminar on the Road

Jackson, Michigan

September 17-18, 2010

Rediscovering Paul; with Bernard Brandon Scott & Arthur J. Dewey

The legacy of the apostle Paul dominates early Christianity—he is the reputed author of half of the New Testament and the dominant character in the book of Acts. He is often credited—or blamed—for many traditional moral positions still debated in our culture. But, over the past twenty years, a new Paul has emerged one who differs from that of Augustine & Luther.

Lecture ~ Friday evening, 7:30–9 P.M. Will the Real Paul Please Stand Up?

We normally homogenize the various versions of Paul found in the New Testament. In this session. we will sort through these versions in an effort to discover the real Paul and to understand how the Pauline tradition developed.

Bernard Brandon Scott (Ph.D., Vanderbilt University) is the Darbeth Distinguished Professor of New Testament at the Phillips Theological Seminary, Tulsa, OK. He is the author of several books, including *The Trouble* with the Resurrection (2010) and Re-Imagine the World (2002), and editor of the Jesus Seminar Guides series.

Arthur J. Dewey (Th.D., Harvard University) is Professor of Theology, Xavier University, Cincinnati, Ohio, co-founder of the Healing Deadly Memories Program, and co-author of The Authentic Letters of Paul (with Roy Hoover & Lane McGaughy, 2010).

Imperial Images in Stone and Song

Rome—and its Emperor—was the dominant power in the ancient world, militarily, and politically, and also ideologically. It set the terms of debate. The recognition of imperial influence is important to understanding Paul. In this session, we will explore the early Christian hymn embedded in Paul's letter to the Philippians for its imperial imagery. ~ Saturday, 9:30—10:30 A.M.

The fact that the New Testament was written in Greek, not English, inevitably leads to translation problems. Paul for a New Day

Paul is the first great Christian thinker. Perhaps a return to Paul can help us see where we might go in the future. What clues, if any, can we glean from his interpretation of Jesus' meaning in the Roman Empire? Can he help us rethink our way in a new global environment?~ Saturday, 3-4 P.M.
