Minister's Column

Welcome back! Fall is my favorite time of year - probably because I always loved school growing up, and couldn't wait to go back and see my friends and meet my new teachers. I loved getting new school supplies and fresh new clothes to wear for the year. This fall means going back to school for me again, too. After taking a year and a half off from adjunct teaching, I'm teaching again this fall. But this time instead of teaching English, I'm teaching communications. That means no papers to grade, but a new course to prepare for, which should be a fun challenge for me.

This fall we're planning another bring-a-friend Sunday, probably in October, so watch for more information about that. I've found that doing a regular class for weeks in a row is difficult with my schedule, because there are regular meetings on every day of the week that I would schedule a class for, making it impossible to both go to meetings and keep a regular class schedule if I'm the solo teacher. One session workshops mean a lot more flexibility, and so, hopefully, if these are popular, I'll be doing more of them over the year. If you have a subject you're interested in, let me know! And, again, if there's something you're interested in leading or teaching, please have a conversation with me about that!

The 2013-2014 Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Common Read is <u>Behind the Kitchen Door</u> by Saru Jayaraman (Ithaca, NY: Cornell University Press, 2013). Rev. Cindy will be preaching on this book later in the fall, so now is a good time to get one and read it.

The book reveals how restaurant workers live on some of the lowest wages in America and how poor working conditions—discriminatory labor practices, exploitation, and unsanitary kitchens—affect the meals that arrive at our restaurant tables. The author tells the stories of ten restaurant workers in cities across the United States as she explores the political, economic, and moral implications of eating out. The book invites follow up action by Unitarian Universalist individuals, groups, and congregations that choose to include advocacy for just working conditions for restaurant workers as part of a commitment to ethical eating.

UUCEL On-Line Easy On-Line Fundraisers
