Our size was always small enough that we would fit in our sanctuary, which has a comfortable capacity of about 68 people ("comfortable capacity" means 30 inches of space per person). Our theology and flag have been a source of disagreement since Ruth Smith brought in Humanism and atheism and took out the flag during her tenure from 1961-1981.

There are so many ways that this job of doing ministry together has changed – social media and web presence is a major example. But there are things that have stayed the same – such as church being about people's need to find connection and community and explore spirituality.

What I hope most of all is that in the past ten years we've all grown in some way. Ideally we would grow in understanding, in openness, in connection, in empathy. I hope we have a greater understanding of the strength of our diversity and a greater sense of mission in our community.
