Minister's Column

It's been a couple of years since I last did a sermon series. This month I'll be doing a three-part sermon series on the voting rights march in Selma, and its legacy and impact. Why does this subject deserve so much attention? There's so much to say on the issue that it simply can't all be said in one sermon. To begin with, I'll talk about how the civil rights struggle of fifty years ago is still relevant and important today. How does the issue of voting rights still matter? How does the death of Jimmie Lee Jackson connect to some of the deaths last summer in places like Staten Island, Ferguson, and Cleveland? Next, I'll share some of why Selma matters so much to Unitarian Universalism, because of the hundreds of Unitarian Universalists who went and marched in Selma, and those who were killed, and how the death of UU minister James Reeb changed the nation. Lastly, I'll turn to our Michigan civil rights activist Viola Liuzzo, and talk about who she was and what her legacy is. See page 4 for more information on the exhibit that will be on display at our church this month about Viola Liuzzo, courtesy of her sister, Rose Mary Lemming. I've also included a book list on page 3 if you're interested in reading more. I highly recommend Mark Morrison-Reed's book on Selma, which I have been re-reading lately myself. And I have an extra copy of the book on Viola Liuzzo that can be shared.

While we're on the subject of people whose very lives are in danger in America... I took a break to think of how to transition subjects in this article, and opened Facebook, and there in my feed was the story of the death of yet another transgender person – the sixth who has been killed *this year*. 22-year-old Bri Golec was stabbed to death recently, allegedly by her father, in Akron Ohio. Our church has been a leader in LGBT rights in our community, and so it's with great excitement that I announce we're going to be hosting a special transgender photo display in our social hall, tentatively scheduled for April. The board has approved the display, and I've been working with the organization that owns the travelling display, which was at the UU church in Southfield earlier this year and is currently on display at the UU church in Flint. Between March and April, our church will have made some real stands for justice in our community!

Selma Book Suggestions

Interested in reading more about how Selma impacted Unitarian Universalism? The following are some book suggestions.

The Selma Awakening: How the Civil Rights Movement Tested and Changed Unitarian Universalism by Mark Morrison-Reed (available at the UUA Bookstore and on Amazon)

This book is the definitive book for understanding our movement and how Selma impacted it. Morrison-Reed begins with the decades leading up to Selma to explain where our movement was on the issue of Civil Rights and racism leading up to Selma, and then describes in detail the response. Also recommended are Morrison-Reed's books Black Pioneers in a White Denomination and Darkening the Doorways: Black Trailblazers and Missed Opportunities in Unitarian Universalism.

From Selma to Sorrow: The Life and Death of Viola Liuzzo by May Stanton (available on Amazon).

There are only a couple of books about Viola Liuzzo, and this book is the best of them, recommended by family members.

No Greater Love: The James Reeb Story (available on Amazon) the best biography of James Reeb. This book is written by a friend and colleague of James Reeb's and helps the reader to know just how remarkable this young minister who was killed in Selma was.

Call to Selma: Eighteen Days of Witness by Richard S. Leonard (available at the UUA Bookstore and on Amazon)
Richard S. Leonard is the only Unitarian Universalist minister who marched the entire route from Selma to Montgomery, since the numbers were limited by court order on a narrower piece of highway. His first-hand

account of the march brings the event to life.

Southern Witness: Unitarians and Universalists in the Civil Rights Era by Gordon Gibson (available at the UUA Bookstore and on Kindle at Amazon) The newest book on the market, this book was just published in February. Gordon Gibson has been an organizer of the "Living Legacy" trips. He was one of the ministers who went down to Selma fifty years ago, and has been a key figure in collecting stories and bringing understanding to what happened.

Spiritual Exercises on Resilience

Our theme for March is "Resilience." Here are some spiritual exercises to explore this theme:

Option A: List 'Em — Carve out some time this month to make a list of your TOP FIVE resiliency practices and habits. For instance, sleep, knitting, exercise, meditation, time with animals, prayer. After you list your top 5, organize them according to these questions:

- Which resiliency practice/habit is "saving" you right now?
- Which one have you let slide and need to start doing more of again?
- Which one was given to you by someone else? Which was a gift?
- · Which one did you discover on your own?
- Which do you need to pass on to someone in your life? Who could benefit from sharing in this strategy? Might you invite them to do it with you?

Option B: Tap Into Your Resilient Past —

Therapists and spiritual directors tell us that one of the best ways to bring resiliency back into our lives is to revisit a time in our life when we were successfully resilient. This month take some time to revisit and honor a time when your powers of resiliency were at their peak. There are many ways to honor this period of your life: write the story down, ask a close friend to be a witness and listen to you retell the story, wear clothes or even the hairstyle from that period, play a song connected with the event over and over this month or be bold and get a tattoo to permanently keep that time in your life close.

Option C: Play That Resilient Tune — We all know it works: That perfect song played at the perfect time gives us the strength to hold on, keep going and struggle back toward joy. This month, find that perfect song and play it until it bounces you back.

Option D: Test Your Resilience — Use one of these tests for resilience at http://www.resiliencescale.com/your-resilience/test-your-resilience/ and find out your score. What did the questions unearth for you? What are some answers you'd like to see change?

Coming in April — Pioneering Voices: Portraits of Transgender People

Our church is arranging for a special photo display to be housed in our Social Hall in April, featuring photos of transgender individuals and families. The display is titled "Pioneering Voices: Portraits of Transgender People" and is a project of the organization Family Diversity Projects. Pioneering Voices is a museum-quality traveling exhibit including 15 photographs and accompanying text panels of interviews with people of all ages who are transgender and some of their partners and children. Through first-person accounts and positive images, this exhibit seeks to challenge damaging myths and stereotypes about transgender people and to educate people about this marginalized and often invisible group of people. Pioneering Voices celebrates a range of views, opinions, and experiences that are unique and empowering to transgender people everywhere. At the most basic level, Pioneering Voices combats transphobia by breaking silence and making the invisible visible. By encouraging people of all ages to affirm and appreciate diversity, this traveling exhibit contributes to the process of dismantling the destructive power of prejudice and intolerance.
