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Minister's Column

I'm realizing, as our year winds up, that anti-racism work and Black Lives Matters has been an important theme of our year. But just because the year is winding up doesn't mean the work is winding up. I just came back from the marvelous MidAmerica Region Annual Meeting, and it was a wonderful event. The title was "The New in the New Era," but anti-racism and Black Lives Matters were the overarching theme for the week. In the business meeting, our board had a special moment of recognition for the hard work the St. Louis-area churches have been doing since the shooting in Ferguson. In the keynotes at the Regional Assembly, there were many examples given by Rev. Marlin Lavanhar of things they've done at All Souls Unitarian Church in Tulsa and by Rev. Rosemary Bray McNatt of the work being done at Starr King School for the Ministry.

One example I found inspiring from All Souls was that they had a float in their city's annual Martin Luther King Day parade. The float was a model of their church, and played music as they went down the street. When the parade paused, they would stop the music, pull their hoods of their jackets over their heads, and raise their hands in a "don't shoot" position in silence. They did this same thing on Sunday coming down the aisle of the church. (As an aside, Rev. Lavanhar said that in another parade, he had performed a mock same-sex wedding as the float rolled down the street. Imagine doing that in Jackson's Rose Parade in June, the same month that is both gay pride month and the month we're likely to get a decision on the Supreme Court

case on same-sex marriage!) Other examples of anti-racism work done by All Souls include an innovative partnership with a black church and its minister, who became part of their church and their staff, and inclusion of more music and poetry from African Americans on Sundays. Keeping in mind that All Souls is the largest church in our association, and of course the efforts of a 1957-member church can't be simply replicated by a 94-member church. But many of the things they've done may inspire our church to do things in our own way on our own scale.

One of the most pointed remarks by the keynote speakers, I believe by Rev. Lavanhar, was when one of them pointed out that African Americans don't come to our churches because they want to make more white friends. This is something important to remember as our own church grows in diversity and acceptance - not everyone's goals are the same, and while desire for connection and friendship are well-meaning, it can be over-

During the minister's meeting preceding the Regional Assembly, one of our worship services was led by Rev. Barbara Gadon, who is the minister of one of the churches in the St. Louis area. Rev. Gadon talked about the work of her church and others to address racism and Black Lives Matters. Part of the point of her sermon was how hard this work is, and how we may be scared as we do it – scared for our physical safety, or scared that we might uncover disagreement within our community.

Yes, this work is scary, and it's often not clear exactly what we can do and accomplish, what will be most meaningful and effective, and sometimes we will make missteps. But this is work that is important for our liberal religion, our progressive faith, right now. Across the country, I hear stories of churches engaging in this work, and we can learn from them and work with them as we move forward.

May "Tradition" Spiritual Exercises:

Option A: Mess with Tradition

Sometimes honoring a tradition requires that we approach it anew, even "mess with it." And this is the perfect month to make "old" traditions come alive. Mother's Day and Memorial Day can be a time of going through the motions. What might you do this year to make them matter? Come up with a plan of how to engage them in a way you've never done before.

Option B: Take a Second Look at Somebody Else's Tradition

There is a reason others hold on to tradition even if it we don't understand why. Use this month to explore a religious tradition that seems foreign to you but essential and precious to those maintaining it. Learn more about why the Amish still refuse to drive. Why do some young, modern Muslim women still wear the traditional headscarf? Do you really understand Lent? Or why pilgrimages transform people so deeply?

Option C: Prove that Kitchen Traditions are Spiritual

Food produces more traditions than almost any other element of our lives. From the outside these traditions of cooking and eating can seem sweet and sentimental. But we know they are much more than that. We know that there is a deeper reason we fiercely defend homemade birthday cakes or eating the same food every year at Christmas or Thanksgiving. Why is it that you cook Great-Grandma Elaine's chicken soup every time you're sick? Why won't you throw away that old skillet your mom left you? There is a deeper meaning – a life-giving meaning – to traditions of the kitchen and dinner table. Share your kitchen tradition at a meal with someone else.

Option D: A Hope Chest of Tradition

Whether it is an elegant wooden hope chest handed down from family or just a cardboard box in the attic, many of us have a "hope chest" that carries and contains our memories and traditions. Use this month to re-visit what's in yours or to create a new box of traditions and memories.

May Worship Theme: Tradition

May 3 - "Zentangles and Spiritual Practice" – Rev. Dr. Cynthia L. Landrum, Minister No other blog post or magazine article I've written has gotten as much response as my article for the UU World about Zentangles. In fact, I had several conversations this week where people brought it up. What is this spiritual practice, and why is it something people are connecting so much to? I'll explore why I find it helpful and how it's done in this service.

May 10 - "Your Children Are Not Your Children" – Rev. Dr. Cynthia L. Landrum, Minister (Mother's Day) The poet Kahlil Gibran wrote, "Your children are not your children. / They are the sons and daughters of Life's longing for itself." May is "National Foster Care Month," and never have Gibran's words felt truer than since becoming a foster parent. I'll examine the Gibran poem and how parenting is a series of letting go on this Mother's Day.

May 17 - "Conscious Awareness" – Lay Leader: Peg Beison

We will explore how processes in our brains may predispose us to hold particular political views—without our conscious awareness! Are we conservative or liberal because our heads won't let us be otherwise? What does it mean to be conservative or liberal? Can a "home for liberal religion" be open to those who call themselves conservative?

May 24 - "The Fault Line and the Front Line" Rev. Dr. Cynthia L. Landrum, Minister (Memorial Day) Unitarian Universalists are deeply divided over issues of militarism and war. How do we honor the service of those among us, and honor the different perspectives on war and peace at the same time? This service will explore the lines that divide us.

May 31 - "The Open Road to Honalee" – Rev. Dr. Cynthia L. Landrum, Minister May 31 is the birthday of both Unitarian poet Walt Whitman and Peter Yarrow of Peter, Paul, and Mary. Rev. Cindy will weave American poetry and folk music together in this service.
