Minister's Column

This summer we celebrated a major victory with the legalization of same-sex marriage. Our faith has been working for this for decades. Our first resolution on LGBT issues was passed at the General Assembly the year I was born! It was followed with dozens of resolutions on LGBT issues over the decades, specifically endorsing same-sex unions in 1984 and the right to marry in 1996, the year I started seminary. For me, the emphasis on equality and protections for LGBT people has always been a part of the faith I've known – but fighting for this equal right has always been a part of my ministry, too. It's thrilling to celebrate at long last the right to marry across the entire United States. It marks the end of an era, and the end of a long struggle for justice.

The work of LGBT equality isn't entirely finished, however, with the right to marry. We are still one of a number of states where other forms of discrimination are completely legal, including workplace discrimination and discrimination in housing and public accommodations – things we've been pushing for in our Jackson Together group advocating for a non-discrimination ordinance in Jackson. I expect that this group may get revived this fall, unless protections are implemented at a state or national level.

The news about the Supreme Court's decision came while I was at General Assembly this year, and while we celebrated, at the same time our denominational leaders lifted up the fact that while the arc of the universe bends toward justice, there is still a lot of work to be done in other areas. Specifically, this year we saw the growth of the Black Lives Matters movement. One of the Actions of Immediate Witness passed at this year's General Assembly was a support for the Black Lives Matters movement. While it passed overwhelmingly, there was a lot of tension around the vote, because it called for us to do some homework in our understanding of the issues of the movement and what it means to be good allies. I'll be addressing the BLM movement this month in one of our Sunday services.

When the Supreme Court decision was announced, I said, "This is what it feels like to know we can change the world." Our faith was a big part of this change, and we are a part of this faith. Knowing it's possible to make history, to create justice, and to bend the arc of the universe, we need to keep doing that. We don't do it alone, of course – we do it with partners and allies. Together we can make a difference in the other areas of justice, just as we have with marriage.

White Privilege White Responsibility

Whites have many privileges in our society, most of them we don't typically notice. With privilege comes responsibility. This is an important concept in the work to end racism.

This summer in partnership with the Jackson District Library, JACRAA (Jackson Area Civil Rights Awareness Association) is offering three programs in a series, "White Privilege/White Responsibility." The purpose is to explore the concept of white privilege and how it covertly supports racism and discrimination. Since whites created and installed racism for economic and social advantage, and since whites support and benefit from racism (albeit unconsciously), the responsibility falls on whites to uncover what they don't see and work toward ending racism. July 28 was the beginning of the series with portions of the video "Color of Fear." On August 3, Rev. Dr. Melvin Hitchens, pastor at Community AME Church, will deconstruct the frustration of black males that is presented in the "Color of Fear." On August 25, discussion on the comments of white activist Tim Wise will end the series. All programs are at the Carnegie Library Auditorium from 6:30 - 8:45 p.m. Please consider joining us.
