Minister's Column

February's theme is Love, and part of what that theme is about is also our Standing on the Side of Love (SSL) social justice campaign within Unitarian Universalism. SSL has been most focused on immigration, LGBTQ rights, and lately Black Lives Matter. It's been over ten years since our church became a Welcoming Congregation, and I think it's time we look at the renewal process for the Welcoming Congregation certification. If you're interested in working with me on this endeavor, please let me know. I'd like to pull together a group of interested people this month to talk about the process. To renew our status, we would need to:

- 1. Complete the UUA's Assessment Process.
- 2. Offer new opportunities for our congregation to make measurable achievements around LGBTQ issues through education, congregational life, and community outreach.
- 3. Do specific work around transgender identity and welcome, and bisexual and queer identity and welcome.
- 4. Take steps to deepen and broaden our congregation's welcome and inclusion of all. Consider additional programming around how sexuality and gender intersect with race, class, age, and/or ability.
- 5. Have a congregational vote in favor of renewing our Welcoming Congregation status!

You may have noticed that in the past year we've been making some progress towards these steps already. Last spring we hosted a special photo exhibit about transgender people, and this fall invited the Rev. Dr. Julie Nemecek to our pulpit. You may notice that I've recently added the UUA's new LGBTQ Welcoming Congregation logo to our weekly Bellringer, as well. Again, if you're interested in working on this with me and a core group of leaders, please let me know.

This month's exercise is about reconnecting with something or someone you love, and bringing it back into your life in some way. One thing I've been reconnecting with in the last several months is a love of playing board games. It may seem frivolous, but it's something I greatly enjoyed when I was growing up, but hadn't done as much of in previous years. This past summer at the UU camp our family has been attending, we were lucky to share a suite with a family with a love of board games, and we fell into a group of people who played board games every night. And it was a time when I not only rediscovered my love of game playing, but got to learn about some new games. This year for Christmas, I got several of those games as gifts from family members, and have been playing them with family and friends. We spent Christmas Eve with a group of friends at a "Game Lounge" in Plymouth, where they have hundreds of board games for people to come

This month's theme exercise: LOVE

A Soul Matters facilitator writes,

"I was cleaning my hiking boots yesterday- it felt like massaging the feet of an old friend. Looking at the cuts and scrapes-noticing that the sole was worn almost flat, but their character and soul was very much intact. As I rinsed the saddle-soap suds away I realized that my "old friends" were coming apart- beyond repair. I dried them, put them in the sun. All day I passed them, casting growing shadows as they sat there. I felt an unconditional love, and a loss."

For most of us, hiking boots are not the first things that come to mind when one mentions love, or a "life of love." But who of us doesn't have something, someone or some activity that's served as an "old friend"? That's what this month's exercise is all about: noticing an old friend—an old love—that we've allowed to fall from the center of our attention and the core of our living. And it's not just about noticing this old love, it's about re-claiming it, about taking a couple concrete steps to bring it back to your life.

So here's your charge in a nutshell:

- Find an object or take a picture that represents a "love" you've let slip from your life.
- Place that object or picture in a prominent place for the month of February—some place you will see it every day.
- Commit yourself to doing <u>TWO</u> things during February that will reconnect you with that love. (Yes,

- <u>two</u> things: one will come easy; the second will challenge you to get creative!)
- Use that object or picture to hold you accountable.

Here's something that might help. Think about those times in your life recently when you've caught yourself saying, "I used to love to ______." or "I'd love to ______ again." Remember this is not about trying something new. It's about remembering, reclaiming and reconnecting – returning to self, to the self that you've let slip a little.

Don't you just love the idea of our friend's hiking boot sitting in the middle of his kitchen table all month? What will it be for you? A piano book on your office desk that encourages you to set up piano lessons again—for the first time in 40 years!? A picture of your wife in your wallet that holds you accountable to weekly date nights in February? An order of service from church that reminds you that regular attendance at church ends up making you feel as good (maybe even better) as regular visits to the gym? Or maybe it's not so grand; maybe it's about returning to something simple that just makes you happy—like spoiling yourself with really good coffee or wine or cheese! Or making time again for going to the movies like you did as a kid. And have fun with it! May this be a month of welcoming those "old strangers" and "old loves" back to our tables!

The Flint Water Crisis:

Many UUs have been wondering how they can help with the Flint water crisis. Rev. Deane Oliva, minister of the UU Congregation of Flint has written this letter on how we can help.

Dear Good People,

Thank you for your interest and support. Here are a few remarks and suggestions concerning the water crisis in Flint. For more information, please do not hesitate to contact me.

First and foremost, the crisis is not exaggerated. The pipes are corroded, the water is contaminated, distribution of water and water filters is a welcome but totally inadequate response. Fixing the now ruined infrastructure is both necessary and costly.

Importantly, testing has clearly shown elevated levels of lead in the systems of Flint children. Know this: the effects of lead poisoning are permanent and affect the cognitive, physical, regulatory, social, and behavioral aspects of the individual causing, learning, behavioral, attentional, and physiological problems, potentially for the rest of one's life. For children, treatment consists of immediate riddance of the lead source, healthy diet, increases in Vitamins C, calcium, zinc, phosphorous and iron; educational, language, hearing, behavioral and mental health resources and assistance.

Please spread the word. Test the water in your area. Be mindful of the toxic materials we are placing into our environment as a result of the plastic and chemicals being utilized.
