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Minister's Column

White Supremacy Teach-In FAQ

The organization Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (known as BLUU) is an organizing collective defines itself saying, "BLUU Organizing Collective works to provide support, information & resources for Black Unitarian Universalists. We also work to expand the role & visibility of Black UUs within our faith." BLUU has asked UU churches to shift from business as usual and participate in a teach-in on racism and white supremacy. There are several questions people might have about this teach-in, and I'll answer some of them below, giving BLUU's answer and my own answer.

What is white supremacy?

BLUU's answer: Why "white supremacy" as the term here? It conjures up images of hoods and mobs. Here, we mean: "White supremacy as a set of institutional assumptions and practices, often operating unconsciously, that tend to benefit white people and exclude people of color." In 2017, actual "white supremacists" are not required in order to uphold white supremacist culture. Building a faith full of people who understand that key distinction is essential as we work toward a more just society in difficult political times. Rev. Cindy's answer: "White supremacy" is a term that can make us uncomfortable when we talk about ourselves as an institution that includes white supremacist culture. I understand this. When I first heard the term, it made me uncomfortable as well, and I'm still not entirely comfortable when I hear it applied to us. But what I'm asking is that we sit with that discomfort, and acknowledge it, and try to move through it. I'm not asking you to be comfortable with the term; I'm asking you to engage with your discomfort.

What is the UU White Supremacy Teach-In and how did it originate? BLUU's answer: For more information on what spurred this call to action, read: Christina Rivera "On being a 'good fit' for the UUA" (http://tinyurl.com/ lyjwg6w), Aisha Hauser "Letter to UUA Board of Trustees"

It has become clear that, in order for us to be more effective at tackling the white supremacy beyond our walls, we must also identify ways in which systems of supremacy and inequality live within our faith and our lives.

Rev. Cindy's answer: The precipitating event for the White-Supremacy Teach-In was a new hire into senior leadership in the UUA that brought awareness to ways in which inequality is present in our hiring practices and the highest levels of leadership, in particular, in our association. But that is not all that the White Supremacy Teach-In is about, and not the only thing that led to this.

Why is our congregation participating?

BLUU's answer: Large shifts require work and can challenge our comfort levels. That's precisely why we feel it's important. We believe that hundreds of UU churches signaling to their own members and to the larger community that "our faith takes racism seriously, especially within our own walls" will push our faith toward the beloved community we all seek." Rev. Cindy's answer: When I find that I'm uncomfortable with a position that our faith is taking. I've found again and again that the thing to do is to lean into that challenge, and by doing so I can grow in awareness and sensitivity. I agree with BLUU that our doing this can add to the message that we take racism seriously in our faith, and we seek to become the beloved community we envision, even if that means hard work.

How does white supremacy culture show up in our congregation?

BLUU's answer: The UUA Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministries shared an example (http://tinyurl.com/k4dglmf) of courageous reflection and inventorying of where white supremacy lives in their organizational culture and practices. You might use this as a model to be emulate in your own congregation, whether done as a group and/or addressed in worship. Additionally, this resource (http://tinyurl.com/pxzpwtx) outlines some of the invisible rules and assumptions of white supremacy culture.

Rev. Cindy's answer: The answer to this is part of what we will explore together. One question to consider: Have we simply taken it for granted that most people of color wouldn't be interested in our church?

Shouldn't this teach-in be led by a person of color?

BLUU's answer: If your regular worship leaders, lay and ordained, are white, that's okay—just make public note of it. Showing awareness goes a long way. We don't see this teach-in as about proclaiming a false "diversity." We want churches to say, "This is who we are (whoever that is), and we commit to combating white supremacy culture 'out there' and 'in here.'

Rev. Cindy's answer: This teach-in is primarily directed towards white people – it is teaching us about how white supremacy culture works and how we unconsciously perpetuate it. Therefore, it's appropriate that while we make space for voice of people of color, we don't try to hide who we are and put forward a false impression that we're more diverse than we are, that we have more people of color in leadership than we do, or that we have everything figured out. This is an opportunity to learn and to grow.

How do we take care of the people of color in our congregation?

BLUU's answer: Ask them.

Rev. Cindy's answer: It can be uncomfortable for people of color, particularly when they are our children and youth, to feel like we're looking to them for the answers to our problems. I'll be reaching out to some of the people of color and the parents of people of color in our congregation and asking how we can take care of them while we have this conversation. But if I miss you, please reach out and let me know how we can best support you.

Notes from the Board

The Board met with a full quorum, plus three guests. We discussed many positive new developments including the upcoming installation of a camcorder in our Sanctuary which will be able to film our sermons. This fulfills a long series of requests we have had to make sermons available to those who can't get to church and we are very happy that it's finally happening. We discussed the upcoming auction scheduled for Saturday, May 6 a reminder that it starts a little earlier this year, dinner is at 4:00pm and the auction starts at 5:00pm. An important change in our schedule is that our annual meeting is being moved to **Sunday**, May 21st due to a number of scheduling conflicts we all had. Please mark your calendars accordingly. Our Spiritual Exercises: Joy OPTION A "Five Photos in Five Days"

The poet Mary Oliver writes,
"Every day, I see or hear something
that more or less kills me with delight,
that leaves me like a needle
in the haystack of light.
It was what I was born for —
to look, to listen,
to lose myself inside this soft world —
to instruct myself over and over in joy and
acclamation."

Anne Sexton also lifts up this pervasive and simply joy in her poem "Welcome Morning": "There is joy in all: in the hair I brush each morning, in the Cannon towel, newly washed, that I rub my body with each morning, in the chapel of eggs I cook each morning, in the outcry from the kettle that heats my coffee each morning, in the spoon and the chair that cry "hello there, Anne" each morning, in the godhead of the table that I set my silver, plate, cup upon each morning. All this is God right here in my pea green house each morning..."

That last line invites us to look around at our own simple and divine surroundings. It asks us to pay attention to and let in the holy joy right in front of us.

With that in mind, here's your exercise:

Capture five images of everyday joy five days in a row! Keep that camera on your phone ready – or if you don't have a camera at hand simply keep a notebook near you and write it down. Just wake up and walk around with a bit more awareness of the thing that is trying to "kill you with delight."

Come to your group ready to share your images, and how they "instruct you over and over in joy and acclamation."
